# Speakers

- **A/Prof Suzie Miller** studies brain development and the mechanisms by which compromised pregnancies may alter brain development, such that targeted neuroprotective therapies can be examined. Suzie is a Deputy Director of the Ritchie Centre and heads the Neurodevelopment and Neuroprotection Research Theme. Suzie holds an NHMRC Senior Research Fellowship.
- **Dr Rebecca Lim** is a stem cell biologist specialising in gestational tissue derived stem cells. Bec is a Deputy Director of the Ritchie Centre and heads the Amnion Cell Biology Research Theme. Bec is a NHMRC Career Development Fellow and holds joint appointments with the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Monash University and The Ritchie Centre, Hudson Institute of Medical Research. Bec holds adjunct appointments at the Australian Regenerative Medicine Institute and Chinese University Hong Kong. She serves on the scientific advisory board of the Centre for Commercialisation of Regenerative Medicine – Australia, and is a director of Meluha Capital, a Malaysian-owned biotech company.
- **Professor Rosemary Horne** has research interests which cover numerous aspects of sleep in infants and children. Rosemary is a Senior Principal Research Fellow and heads the Infant and Child Health Research Theme within the Ritchie Centre. She is Chair of the Physiology working group of the International Society for the Study and Prevention of Infant Deaths and former chair of the Red Nose (formerly SIDS and Kids Australia) National Scientific Advisory Group, a Director of the International Paediatric Sleep Association, and is on the editorial boards of the Journal of Sleep Research, Sleep and Sleep Medicine.
